

## Sweet Home Library

We have come a long way from the kitchen through the basement over to this building — from a few donated books to over 30,000 volumes and nearly 300 videos — but I want to talk to you about the people who made all of this happen.

In the fall of 1941 the P.T.A. President, Mrs. Ivan Hay appointed a committee to explore the possibility of sponsoring a City Library. Pearl Hay is with us today. She lives in Albany.

That committee of Mrs. Clyde Scott, Mrs. Jack Wise and Mrs. Jess Jones with Mrs. John T. Russell and Mrs. Ivan Master became the First Sweet Home Library Board. Esther Jones of this board is here today. Esther lived in Albany. She acted as the first librarian.

We have had many librarians after Esther Jones. Alice Stoney was the first paid one — she was followed by Ethel Towers, Alta Hermans, and Mrs. Kneal. Then

in 1953 Ethel Gould was hired -  
She held that position until 1970.  
Was librarian during the planning  
and building of this building  
- helped engineer the moving  
and stock the shelves. Ethel  
Gould (she lives) in Sweet  
Home.

Joan Browning, our first  
professional librarians came in 1970.  
With the new facilities, added city  
money, a federal grant and a  
gift of books from the State  
Library - we were growing  
rapidly - time to hire an  
assistant. Arlene Emerson was  
hired. She was a "wiz". We  
have never really forgave her  
for leaving. Arlene

In 1973 Joan decided to leave the  
field of books and pursue  
that of medicine. She now  
practices in Portland - Joan.

Joan's position was filled by  
Nikki Hines. Nikki was here  
during the best of times and the  
worst of times. She had three  
paid assistants and a grant-  
aid student - then the City

Nikki is now  
the Librarian for  
the County Service Division  
of the Board.

now into budget problems.  
The library was closed for  
over a month - then opened  
with a skeleton budget with  
just enough to pay Nikki  
and the ~~utilities~~ utility bills.  
In May 19<sup>86</sup> Nikki left. Velma  
Cook, Pat Statman and Leona  
Mc Conn - all former assistants  
were hired to run the  
library until the serial  
bond was passed. After the  
bond passed these three  
continued with their jobs.  
Later Leona Mc Conn was  
hired as Director. She has  
a wonderful staff - Velma  
Cook, Lillian Brown and  
Dallas Morris.

That is the story of the Library  
from Esther to Leona.

There have been 46 board members.  
41 women - 5 men.

The board we remember the  
most with the exception of  
the first one is the one between  
1966-1969. These women planned  
and sold the bond issue  
for the new library to

the voters. (Some company  
shares have hired them  
they did such a good  
job.) The largest per centage  
of registered voters voted  
than ever before - it  
passed by a large majority.  
They were Lee Dudley, Betty  
Henthorne, Janet Wise, Vangie  
Sanderson (She lives at the Twin  
Oaks Nursing Home). - But the  
Chairman Frances Edwards  
is here today. (She lives in  
Monmouth.)

When the library was closed  
in 19<sup>86</sup> - some Daisy Godmothers  
and their magic friends rode  
into the library - we knew  
them as the Friends of the  
Library - They raise their  
money by selling used books  
and crafts - ~~which~~ This  
They pay for all craft  
materials and refreshments  
for the children's programs.  
They have bought the typewriter  
which is rented to the patrons,  
the portable telephone and  
answering machine, the safe  
the video carousal, the library  
brochures and staff conferences

and work shops. They are paying for this party.

Many books have been given to the library in memory or honor of someone.

A gift of \$5,000 was left to the library by William Miedonge's estate. Mr. Miedonge was a former Rist #55 School Superintendent. The money was used to start a needed library.

Last year Carol Gossel's family and friends gave the library over \$1,000 in her memory. This was used to start the Children's Classical Video Collection.

The Sweet Home Literary Council, one of the best in the state, is sponsored by the library and the Friends. Shirley Eddy is the director and Norma Peters the chairman.

Mary Linnan from the State Library is here. She has been a good friend to the Sweet Home Library.
