# **Sweet Home Public Library Year End Report: 2014**

- Expanded our partnership with the libraries of Albany, Lebanon, Linn Benton Community College, Harrisburg and Scio. We merged, using the Evergreen ILS to provide a shared catalog. We are working towards a consortium where we can share resources and provide a courier service between these libraries.
- Replaced 6 out-of-date public access computers, with the Trust Management Grant, to provide a more stable technology environment for our patrons.
- Registered over 225 children and teens for the Summer Reading program, offering 14 free programs through the support from Comcast and 17 local businesses and the Friends of the Sweet Home Library.
- Continued the collaborative effort with other libraries in Oregon to extend library services through the Passport Program.
- Completed the stained glass window with the support of the community through donations and memorial gifts and a grant from the Sweet Home Community Foundation.
- Increased our collection of books, books on CDs and DVDs by 3,122 items with monies from our current year budget and the Friends of the Sweet Home Library.

# **Program Highlights from 2014**

The role of Libraries in children's literacy development can be seen in two key programs offered by the Library: Summer Reading and Friday Morning Story Times.

Yes, we make a big deal about Summer Reading, because it is one of the most popular programs of the year with hundreds of participants. Why the big deal? Research shows that kids who read in the summer do NOT lose education progress and are ready to start their next grade level successfully. Plus, it's fun and free. Finding affordable activities for kids in the summer can be challenging and we help fill that need each year.



Sweet Home Public Library's 2014 *Fizz, Boom, Read*Summer Reading Program was another successful series of programs including science activities with Mad Science, Sylvia Branzei, "the queen of grossology" demonstrating how

The State Library identified three best practices in library services to children that research shows can have the greatest impact on reading proficiency. The three best practices are services to children outside the library (outreach), summer reading programs, and early literacy training for parents and childcare providers.. The Sweet Home Public Library was recognized for implementing all three of these best practices.

**Friday Morning Story Times** -- Story times continue to educate and entertain children and parents through the use of a wide range of high-quality picture books, songs, poetry, fingerplays, and crafts. We make literacy fun!

**World Book Night** – We continued to spread the love of reading by giving away 30 copies of *Young Men and Fire* by Normal Maclean to students at the high school.

**"See to Read Program"** -- OHSU and the Elks Club brought the "See to Read Program" that performed vision screening for preschool children entering Kindergarten as mandated by the Governor.
